—Miss Harriet Jarratt, who has been spending some time with Mr. and Mrs. James C Gibson returned to Winston, her home, this morning.

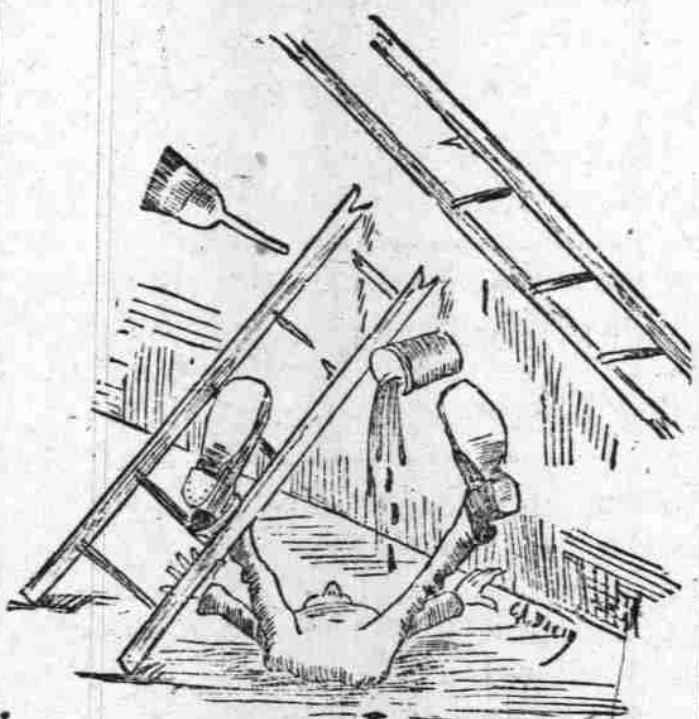
—Miss Constance Cline left last evening for Bridgewater, Mass., where she has gone to enter a high grade educational institution to equip herself for teaching.
