Miss Alexander Will Teach.

The regular monthly meeting of the board of school commissioners was held Monday afternoon, and after the routine business was transacted, a teacher was elected to take charge of the fifth grade at the central school. The fifth and sixth grades were consolidated, but the number was too large for one person to handle, and consequently had to be divided. Miss Audie Alexander was elected to take charge of the fifth grade, and will enter upon duty as instructress on Monday next. Mrs. Cote and Miss Belle Moser, who have charge of the school at Forest Hill, have enrolled 135 scholars.

Misses Jennie Patterson and Lena Leslie, who teach at Cannonville, have about 90 scholars enrolled.

At the Central building there is an attendance of about 350. At the three schools combined the aggregate enrollment is 575, with an average attendance of something over 500.
