Gang of Desperadoes Lest Peris,

Tenn, and Fire the Houses. NASHVILLE, TENN, Oct. 14.-A gang of masked men looted the little town of Peria, in Henry county, early this morning. The citizens were awakened at 4 o'clock by the sound of an explosion and the firing of guns and revolvers. Those residents who were daring enough to eave their houses were warned to return under pain of death. In order to intimidate the people the gang kept up an incessant discharge of their firearms. There were eight men in the party and all were heavily masked. After robbing a number of stores the gang set fire to several buildings and then fled to the country.
