MR. POU HOPEFUL.

He Finds that the Democrats are Making Gains in Every County in the District.

Mr. E. W. Pou, candidate for Congress in the Fourth district, arrived in the city Thursday. He is quite hopeful of his prospects of election. In conversation, he said:

"The Democratic party is making gains every day. There is not a county in this district in which we are not stronger than we were two years ago. There were more than two thousand Democrats who did not vote in the last election in this district. Every one of these men will vote with us this time. In addition to this vote, we are making substantial gains from both parties. Not a day passes on our canvass but some Populist tells me he will vote with us. A large per cent. of the rank and file of that party have already repudiated the deal with the Republicans.

Every Democrat to his post and I believe the victory is ours. At all events, if defeat comes we will have the consciousness of knowing that we have not sacrificed our principles or the honor of our party."

As it stands today, Mr. Pou will win if the Democrats all over the district will register, and go to work actively from now until the day of the election. The fact that he was willing to retire from the race if the State Executive Committee could thereby make the State safe for silver and good government, will be a strong card in his favor. The people want silver Congressmen, and they will rebuke the machine of any and every party that makes "deals" looking to the elevation of goldbugs. During all the talk that looked to uniting the silver forces, Mr. Pou remained upon the stump fighting the battle for free coinage. He will continue to do so till election day. He is winning votes everywhere.—News and Observer.

Johnston, Morrison Fetzler and Lindsay Ross, of this city, are students at the school.

It will be remembered that Prof. Bingham was attacked with typhoid fever and after a lingering, wasting illness, he began to improve. He suffered a relapse, however, with the more deplorable result.
