

CYRUSB. WATSON WILL WIN.

"Bob" Glenn Makes Out the Real Line of Battle.

In a letter to the Raleigh News and Observer, Hon. R B G een expresses himself on the political situation. The following is what he has to sav :

"While some seem disposed to criticise harshly the action of our Executive committee in offering complete fusion to the Populists, I believe that wh n they have time quietly to consider the matter, that they all will agree with me, that the proposition was one that commenda itself to the best element of both the Democratic and Populist parties. "We have already fused on the electoral ticket, the platforms of the two parties on the questions of tariff, the in come tax, trust and monopolies and finance being about the same.

"Both parties are pledged to use their best efforts to elect Mr. Bryan and to see to it that he is supported by a silver Congress. To do this, it is necessary to send a silver delegation to the House of Representatives, and to let no gold man be our next Senator.

"Again, while we felt certain that we could elect Mr. Watson Governor, still we know the means the Republicans were resorting to, by illegal registration, of colored men under age, who are not bona fide




