The Election.

At the time of going to press we cannot give anything like an accurate estimate of how the election will go—but it is beyond all question that one of the many tickets will be successful and that we will have officers that we trust will give us freedom and good government.

In Wards 1 and 3 the Democrats will have a majority, but in Wards 2 and 4 the Democrats have "gone to the Yanks." As to the county none of the townships have been heard from.

The "Original Package" Again.

The Post does not question the soundness of the "original package" decision which created such consternation in prohibition States a few years ago. That decision rests on the same foundation as the interstate commerce act—the right of Congress to regulate commerce between the States. But we think there are five American citizens of any sect, race or party who desire to witness any humiliating belittlement of the police powers of any of the forty-five Commonwealths that constitute this republic. When the people of a State have decided, through their Legislature, that an article which they deem dangerous to health shall not be manufactured or sold in their State, it seems to us that their right to do so should not be over-riden by any authority.

Here, for example, is the State of Iowa, which has a very stringent anti-cigarette law. We think it likely that the law is open to just criticism. We are not in favor of superseding paternal responsibility by legislative enactments. But the merits or demerits of this act are not a matter of legitimate concern to anybody outside of Iowa. That State has said that cigarettes are not to be sold there. But the tobacco trust had notified dealers in the State that it will defend cases brought against them, and will meantime ship cigarettes into the State in 5-cent "original packages." And this is a safe proceeding on the part of the trust, for, as the precedents now stand, the law is not worth shucks against the "original package" device. If the State wishes to have its law made effective, it must induce Congress to pass an act removing cigarettes from the articles of legitimate interstate commerce.

Such humiliation of a Commonwealth is not calculated to promote patriotism. Under the law as it stands the manufacture of an article in a State may be prohibited, but outsiders can send in and sell the prohibited article in any quantity. We think Iowa ought to be able to enforce an anti-cigarette law without calling on Congress for help. It is a needless belittlement of a State.

The "Union, strong and great," owes none of its strength and greatness to collisions with the police powers of the States which compose it.—Washington Post.

A roar of laughter went up from the crowd and for once the Colonel was not ready with a good response.


