A Convict Hurt.
 Superintendent Leffer, with the
 chain gang, is quartered on the Corl
 plantation, southwest of town. He
 came near having to bury one of his
 men Friday. The convicts were
 working on an embankment and two
 men were using picks. The eyesight
 of one convict is badly affected and
 just as Will Rendleman, one of the
 negroes, raised himself straight
 from a stooped position, the
 nearsighted man drove his pick
 several inches into the hip of Rend-
 leman. The wound is not a serious
 one but very painful. It was purely
 accidental. Had Rendleman not
 raised up just as he did, he would
 have been a dead negro—the pick
 would certainly have penetrated his
 body.
