Miss Jennie Sapp will close her school to-day and spend the holidays at her home in Concord.

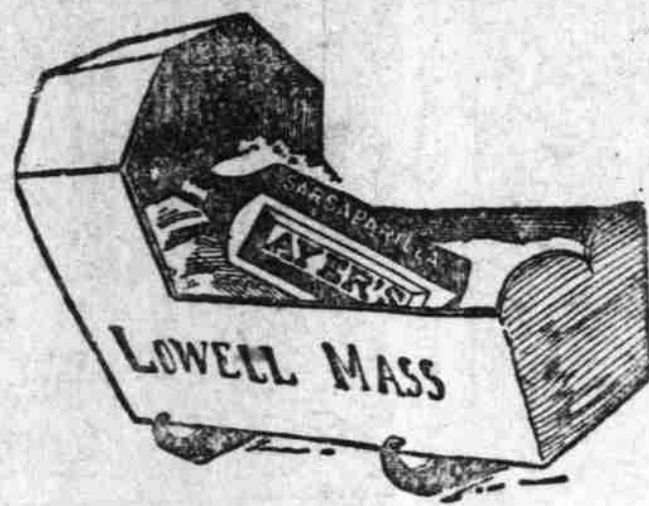
J. M. Faggart, Esq., we are sorry to learn, has had another stroke of paralysis and his condition is considered critical.
