REV. MR. MOSER DEAD.

He Has Joined the Host That Have Crossed the Flood.

Rev. J. F. Moser, pastor of the Lutheran church at Mt. Holly, died last evening at 6 o'clock, at his home at that place, of pneumonia. Mention had been made in the Observer last week of Mr. Moser's critical illness, and the news of his death will not be a surprise to his friends in this section. He was a faithful, earnest worker in the master's vineyard, and as he enters into rest, he hears that welcome plaudit, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." Mr. Moser was formerly pastor of the church at Monroe. He had many friends here and wherever known.

Rev. Dr. Bowman and other prominent Lutherans from here will attend the funeral, which will take place tomorrow.—Charlotte Observer.

AT THE CAPITAL.

Proceedings of the General Assembly in Brief.

SENATE.

RALEIGH, Feb. 3.—A petition was presented from the employes of the Victoria Cotton Mills, of Charlotte, for regulating the hours of labor. This provides for eleven hours as a day's work.

A bill was offered for the erection of a building for the deaf and dumb at Morganton; a bill to prevent discrimination in passenger accommodations; A bill to provide for divorces in certain cases of females under the age of 18 years; A bill to fix the time of qualification of justices of the peace. It provides that the term of office shall begin as soon as they qualify. This passed its second and third readings.

A bill passed its final readings amending section 1014 of the Code, making guardians, administrators and executors indictable for misappropriation of funds.

A bill with reference to authorizing the Governor to ascertain all the offices of over \$2,500 salaries in the railroad, steamboat, express and telegraph services was referred to committee. The object is to reduce passenger and freight rate.

A bill passed its second and third reading making all notes, bonds, bills and mortgages or any private obligation payable in any kind of money at its face value though reported adversely. Amendments allowing payment in specified money was voted down.

A bill embodying the Governor's ideas as outlined in his inaugural with reference to lynching trials was discussed but was laid aside for the special order of the hour for the consideration of appointing females as notaries public. After some discussion the bill was voted down.

On motion the use of the hall was granted for the Emancipation Celebration on the evening of February 9th.

A resolution was adopted raising a committee to ascertain and report if any alterations or improvements are needed at the Executive Mansion.

A bill was passed to prevent any railroad company from owning another line competitive to it and also to prevent any line paralleling any road owned by the State.

At the night session a resolution was adopted urging our congressmen to secure the repeal of the civil service law.
