A Cabarrusite Died in Arkansas.

On the 28 of October, 1896, near Potts' Station, Arkansas, Herbert, the oldest child of James Madison Rogers, died, aged 20 years and 11 days. Mr. Rogers left North Carolina about 26 years ago. His father, Wm. P. Rogers, lived and died where Dr. J S Lafferty now lives and was a grand son of John Mc. Lellan, the second Sheriff of Cabarrus County. Herbert was a member of the Associate Reformed church and was preparing for the ministry. He was a good and obedient son. He took great interest in all church work, often leading in prayer. He leaves a father, mother, four brothers two sisters and many relatives in North Carolina.
