### A Desperate Deed—Murder Attempted

The Salisbury Sun tells of a most atrocious crime that occurred Monday morning about half-past 1 o'clock at the Rowan chain gang camp about a mile from the city.

The convicts were out at work and a guard Albert Ray, Jule Cowen the cook and Moore McNeely, a trusty, who was washing clothes were in camp.

Mr. Ray was asleep in the tent when a strange negro man unobserved went into the tent probably to steal. As he was about to get Mr. Ray's watch, Mr. Ray awoke and before he could realize his danger the negro was slashing him with a large knife cutting several gashes in his face and one across the breast in the region of the heart. Mr. Ray succeeded in getting his pistol and opened fire on him. The villain ran and Mr. Ray followed till some distance from the camp he was overcome by the loss of blood.

Mr. Ray's cries brought the other two men who followed the wretch some distance but had to return and care for Mr. Ray who is terribly wounded but it is hoped not fatally. Mr. Ray thinks he lodged at least two shots in the murderer who is being pursued with some hope of capture.

Latest advices this morning say that Mr. Ray is believed to be out of danger of fatal results.
