All who took any interest in the great lease contest were in an atmosphere of suspense and expectancy for the result of Judge Simonton's court in Greensboro yesterday. Mr. Ed Johnston's Version.

Mr. Johnston called and gave his version of the shooting of Mr. Holdbrooks; geese in substance as follows:

"I repeatedly asked Mr. Holdbrooks to keep his geese off my lands. He had only an open wire fence that did not confine them. They were often degrading on my lands and finding them again on my oats I shot a number of them and threw them over the fence into his pasture. Mrs. Holdbrooks came down. Mr. Johnson says that it is next to impossible for him to drive the trespassing stock away from Mr. Holdbrooks' to his own buildings to impound them as his house is some distance away from Mr. Holdbrooks' but his lands extend close to Mr. Holdbrooks' house.
