## ENGINEER BRYAN HURT.

### Thirteen Tramps On One Train, Two of Whom Were Shot.

Parties coming in from High Point today (Saturday) tell of quite an exciting time on the Southern Railroad a mile above Thomasville last night.

Thirteen tramps were on No. 38, the northbound vestibule, two of whom were on the engine. Jack Bryan, the engineer, stopped the train to put the men on the engine off, but the hoboes resisted and rushed at Bryan with a knife, cutting him in several places. By this time the entire force of tramps started for the engine, when Mr. Bryan drew his revolver and fired into the drunken mob of bums, two of them receiving injuries. Three of the tramps were captured and taken to Danville, where they were turned over to the authorities.

Poses were formed at Lexington, Thomasville and High Point immediately after the "hold-up" and began a search for the tramps.

Particulars of the affair are very meagre, but from what we can learn a very lively time was had for about 20 minutes between the crew and the tramps.

Charred bodies are being found about in the ruins. Large rewards are being offered for the bodies to be restored to relatives.

The total loss is closely estimated at \$1,611,009 and the total insurance at \$614,209.

### Money Buried and in Secret Places.

Mr. John C Smith returned from Ritchfield, Stanly county, Friday, and tells THE STANDARD the following:

Several weeks ago the death of James Russell, an aged man of near Ritchfield, Stanly county, occurred. He was a wagon-maker and wood-worker and it was believed generally that he had saved considerable money and stored it away in secret places, and on last Tuesday, while several parties were engaged in laying off the widow's dowry, a search was made. The dirt floor in the old wagon shop was dug up, and a small block of wood thrown out. Being in a state of decay, the block fell into pieces, and it was found to contain \$405 gold. A two-inch hole had been bored in it and the money stored there. Further search was made and in the old farm house was found \$100 in gold and silver.

### After the Weeping Came Joy.

Two white women who claimed to be from Concord, and said they had come here to work and to live with their aunt, but had found that their aunt had moved away, applied to Mayor Coughenour for money to purchase tickets back to Concord. They were weeping and appeared to be very much worried over their trouble.

The tickets were afterwards purchased and the women returned to Concord.

They tramped from Concord here Thursday morning and were accompanied by another woman and two men. Only the women applied for money to return on. The other women went north and the two men also left the city.—Salisbury Sun.
