A GREAT MEETING IN NASHVILLE.

Ex-Confederate Reunion—Gen. Gordon's Word.

The United Confederate Veteran Association will meet this year at Nashville, Tenn., on the 22nd, 23rd and 24th of June.

The Commander, General John B. Gordon—great in war and great in peace urges Ex-Confederate soldiers and sailors everywhere to form local associations, and send applications to Headquarters for papers to organize Camps immediately, so as to be in time to participate in the great Reunion at Nashville, and thus unite with their comrades in carrying out the laudable and philanthropic objects of the organization; as only Veterans who belong to organized U. C. V. Camps can participate in the business meeting at Nashville.

He says of this meeting:

"It will be the largest and most important U. C. V. Reunion ever held. The personnel of the Nashville Reunion Committee under the leadership of its chairman Col. J. B. O'Bryan, is a guarantee that everything will be done for the comfort and convenience of the old Veterans and all visitors which is in the power of man; it is a splendid body of very able and distinguished Comrades, who are fully alive to the magnitude of the work entrusted to them in entertaining and caring for their old Comrades, and it will be their pride to make it the most memorable Reunion upon record; and the citizens of Nashville are aglow with enthusiasm, and patriotism, at the prospect of dispensing their far famed hospitality to the surviving heroes of the Lost Cause.

Business of the greatest importance to the survivors of the Southern Army will demand careful consideration during the session of the Seventh Annual Convention at Nashville, Tenn.—such as the best methods of securing impartial history and to enlist each State in the compilation and preservation of the history of her citizen soldiery; the benevolent care through State aid or otherwise of disabled, destitute or aged Veterans and the widows and orphans of our fallen brothers in arms; to consult as to the feasibility of the formation of a U. C. V. Benevolent Aid Association; the care of the graves of our known and unknown dead buried at Gettysburg, Fort Warren, Camps Morton, Chase, Douglas, Oakwood Cemetery at Chicago, Johnson's Island, Cairo and at all other points, to see that they are annually decorated, the headstones preserved and protected, and complete lists of the names of our dead heroes with the location of their last resting places furnished to their friends and relatives through the medium of our camps, thus rescuing their names from oblivion and handing them down in history; the consideration of the different movements, plans and means to erect a monument to the memory of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate States of America, also to aid in building monuments to other great leaders, soldiers and sailors of the South; also to assist in the promotion and completion of the proposed "Battle Abbey"; to vote upon the proposed change of the name of the Association U. C. V., to C. S. A.; and to change the present badge or button which is not patentable for the new one proposed which is; and to make such changes in the constitution and by-laws as experience may suggest, and other matters of general interest."

THIRTY GALLONS

Of Mean Corn Whiskey Seized in the Heart of the City.

Revenue Officer George W. Means this (Saturday) afternoon made a seizure of about thirty gallons of mean corn whiskey, and one horse and wagon in the heart of the city. Mr. Means was passing through the lot in rear of the Boyd and Caldwell store rooms, when his eyes fell upon a very suspicious turnout. He approached the wagon and made an investigation without the consent or objections of any one, there being no one in charge of the team. He found buried underneath quilts and straw three kegs, all of which contained about thirty gallons of whiskey. The team and load was taken to Brown Bros., stables, where it is being held. The outfit is supposed to be the property of one Isaac Barbee of the Meadow Creek Church neighborhood near the Stanly and Cabarrus line.
