SONS OF CONFEDERATES.

Camp Was Organized Wednesday Night, Electing a Commander and Interior Officers.

About twenty sons of Confederate veterans met at the court house Wednesday night and organized a camp. Commander D A Caldwell, of the Confederate veterans, was present and told the purposes of the meeting.

Mr. Holland Thompson was called to the chair and Harry Deaton was made secretary. Election of officers was then proceeded with and resulted as follows:

Commander, Mr. Holland Thompson; First Lieutenant, Mr. James R Young; Second Lieutenant, Mr. Robert P Benson; Taird Lieutenant, Mr. John M Cook; Adjutant, Mr. Wm. Gibson; Quartermaster, Mr. S J Evin; Commissary, Mr. D J Bostian; Sergeant Major, Mr. L D Coltrane; Treasurer, Dr. Joe F Goodman; Surgeon, Dr. R S Young; Assistant Surgeon, Dr. D G Caldwell; Chaplain, Rev C B Miller.

At the conclusion of the election of officers, Mr. Thompson made a brief but spicy talk, eulogizing the Confederate veterans and prompting the sons to stimulate and perpetuate the cause for which their fathers so nobly fought.

Each member was made a committee of one to bring members into the association and to work for the success of same.

The camp should have a membership of not less than one hundred and fifty. Let every father's son be up and doing.

The meeting adjourned to meet again at the call of the commander.
