## NINETY-FOURTH ANNUAL CONVENTION.

The North Carolina Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in session at St. John's—Full Attendance—Election of officers.

Rev. V. R. Stickley, president of the North Carolina Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran church, called the 94th convention to order at St. John's, six miles east of Concord, on Thursday at 11 o'clock.

The opening services were conducted by the secretary, Rev. M. G. G. Scherer, president of North Carolina College. The Synodical sermon by president Stickley, was strong, clear and edifying. His theme was "What is Truth."

The Synodical Communion was then held, after which Synod adjourned until 2 o'clock, during the interval a bountiful dinner was served in the Grove by the hospitable people of St. John's.

The business of Synod at the evening session was the enrolling of lay delegates and the election of officers, which resulted as follows:

The hours of Synod are 8:30 to 12 and 2 to 4:30.
