## VETERANS AT NASHVILLE.

Programme of the Confederate Veteran Re-union, June 22-24, 1897.

Having had numerous requests from Confederate Veterans throughout the Southern States for information in regard to the programme for the re-union at Nashville, I beg to advise that the following programme is now arranged by the executive committee, subject to change.

On Tuesday, June 22nd, the Tennessee division will meet at the tabernacle at 11 o'clock, and elect a major-general and three brigadier generals. At 12 o'clock, in the same auditorium, addresses of welcome and responses, and the oration of Hon. John H. Reagan will be delivered. At this meeting the committee on credentials will be appointed. The Daughters of the Confederacy will meet in the hall of Representatives at the capitol at 10 o'clock on Tuesday, and on that evening they will give a reception to the veterans at the same place.

On Tuesday, June 23rd, the business meeting of the convention will be held in the tabernacle, beginning at 10 o'clock in the morning and lasting all day. At 8 o'clock that evening a Confederate concert will be given at the tabernacle, after which the Confederate Reunion Club will give a reception to the visiting sponsors and maids of honor.

On Tuesday, June 24th, the great parade will take place. Gen. W. H. Jackson will be chief marshal. His escort will be the famous Savannah Hussars.

In front of each State division will ride the sponsors and maids of honor, carrying the coat-of-arms of their State.

### Their Infant Dead.

After an illness of several months, the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. John Creech, of Cannonville, died Friday evening at 8 o'clock. The remains of this beloved little darling were laid to rest in the cemetery at Rocky Ridge church today, Rev. H. A.
