A HAPPY HAIT.

It is now good reason to be-
lieve that the treaty annexing Hawaii
is defeated. When the treaty
was introduced to the senate it was con-
firmed. An arrangement was made
that the thing through was
backed by all the administration. The
backers of the treaty were trying to
rush its ratification and finding that it
would be put to a vote at this ses-
sion a very judicial opinion was

The treaty cannot be ratified at
this session and its advocates are
afraid to submit it to a vote, know-
ing that more than one-third of the
senate has refused to be dragged into
support of their scheme. The chances
are that the treaty will be weaker
next December than it is now, and
that it will find its way to the trash
pile where it properly belongs.

President McKinley has greatly
discredited his administration by
lending himself to this scheme. He
has convicted himself of fickleness
and unreliability by going squarely
back on the pledge he gave in such
explicit terms in his inaugural ad-
dress against territorial aggression.
He has been easily captured by the
annexationists and public opinion
of his statesmanship has been dis-
tinctly lowered. The Hawaiian
treaty seems to be doomed to de-
served death.—Atlanta Journal.

THIS IS LESS SO.

Mr. Debs, the head of the new so-
cialistic movement, takes quite a
rank hold for a beginner. Referring
to the attitude of the govern-
ment toward his scheme, he says:

"If they send the regular army to
[the State of] Washington to sup-
press us, we will give them plenty to
think about through the country
along the way. If they try to sup-
press us there will be 300,000 pa-
triotists who will meet them on that
issue."

Mr. Debs has not hesitated to de-
clare that his proposal was revolu-
tionary—that he has for his object a
change in the American system of
government. He proposes a colony
in which everything shall be held in

common; it will be a trust, he says,
but everybody will be in the trust;
there will be no money, but a sys-
tem of "co-operative credit."

Unless a lot of other people are
wrong Debs is not so much out of
the way. He led a movement some
three years ago, in Illinois, for the
destruction of property and to pre-
vent men from working when they
wanted to work. A president of the
United States interfered against him
for the protection of life and prop-
erty because the Governor of the State
would not, and the president was
afterwards denounced by the na-
tional convention of his own party
for his conduct in the matter. Mr.
Debs was revolutionary then and he
is revolutionary now—only less so,
because he says that he hopes and
believes that his present undertak-
ing can be carried through peacea-
bly, whereas there was no pretense
of peace in the former case. And so
it does not lie in the mouths of the
Altgeld sympathizers to denounce
him for the little scheme he has on
foot now.—Charlotte Observer.
