## REV. JESSE H. PAGE VOTED NO.

And He Explained His Vote, Too.—President Kilgo, of Trinity College, Had Addressed the Rockingham District Conference on "Christian Education," and Had Attacked Some Institutions—Mr. Page Voted Against Extending Dr. Kilgo a Vote of Thanks, Saying That He Was Ashamed and Sick of the Doctor's Flings at the University.

MAXTON, July 7.—The monotony of the District Conference proceedings was broken by a lively incident which occurred in the closing hours of the Conference recently held here by the ministers and lay delegates of the Rockingham district.

Dr. Kilgo, of Trinity College, delivered his well-known address on "Christian Education" in eloquent language and with his usual fiery spirit. He drew sharp contrasts between State institutions and denominational schools, representing the latter as conforming to the teachings and dominated by the spirit of Jesus Christ, while the former acknowledge no king but Caesar.

A resolution was offered highly eulogizing and heartily endorsing the speech, and tendering the thanks of the Conference to the eloquent orator for his masterful address. A motion to adopt the resolution was decided by a rising vote. One minister, Rev. Jesse H. Page, of Aberdeen, boldly stood alone "until he was counted" in the negative. Subsequently, in giving his reasons for his vote, he defined his position so clearly and emphatically as to leave no room for misunderstanding it. Without attempting a full report, I will give a few things which he said:

"I have several times listened with pleasure to Dr. Kilgo on his favorite theme—Christian education—and, while I admire his brilliant talents and eloquent speech, and personally hold him in highest esteem as a brother, I wish to say plainly that every one of his speeches which I have heard has been marred to the nauseating degree by his perpetual, ill-timed and ill-tempered flings at our State institutions. I, for one, am ashamed and sick of it, and intend here and now to wash my hands of this whole matter. Let it be known in all our borders, from the mountains to the sea, that there is one Methodist preacher in the Conference who, as a citizen of North Carolina, is proud of the noble record made by our State University, and the grand work she has done in the cause of education during the 100 years of her existence—sending out from her halls a long line of illustrious men, who have filled with credit and honor the highest positions of responsibility in this great country of ours. President Aldermen and those who have charge of our other State schools are neither infidels, atheists nor unenlightened heathen, but are high-toned, cultured Christian gentlemen, who deserve all honor for the great work they are doing for our beloved State and country. To be explicit, let me say that if I had a son to be educated, I would just as soon trust his moral and religious training in the hands

of E A Alderman as J C Kilgo. 'If this be treason, make the most of it.'

"I haven't stopped to count the loss I am to suffer for taking this position and giving utterance to these sentiments. You had before you this morning the question of setting off a mission in a lonely, desolate section of our district. It may be that this field of labor is being prepared especially for me—be it so, I will stand boldly for my honest convictions, whatever it may cost.

"We cannot build up our schools by trying to tear down others, and the institution whose managers are guilty of this ungodly practice, however much money may back it, is doomed to certain failure. Ephraim should not envy Judah, and Judah should not vex Ephraim."
