A COMPARISON.

A correspondent, "The Tattler," writing in the Asheville Citizen, says:

It is distressing to contemplate that the Governor of such a State as North Carolina should use language such as Russell used in speaking of Judge Simonton's decision. No blame can attach to Russell for differing honestly with the judge in the matter, but that he should turn blackguard is unpardonable. Every such exhibition weakens his case in the public mind and makes friends for the Southern Railway. Poor North Carolina.

The Governor's outrageous assault upon Judge Simonton and Kerr Craige, Esq., has, in its fierceness and brutality, astounded and shocked the State. His conduct and language on many occasions since he assumed executive duties have been such as to justify the worst things that were said of him in the campaign which preceded his election. His violence and unreasonableness have made him the dread of many of those who have had to be in contact with him, and have brought upon him the hatred of nearly all the members of his own party as well as of the opposition. There is no character in history with whom he may be so fitly compared as Caius Marcius, afterwards Caius Marcius Coriolanus, the Roman of whom we read in Plutarch's Lives of Illustrious Men:

"He was a man too full of passion and choleric, and too much given over to self-will and opinion, as one of a high mind and great courage, that lacked the gravity and affability that is gotten with judgment of learning and reason, which only is to be looked for in a Governor of State; and that remembered not how wilfulness is the thing of the world, which a Governor of a Commonwealth, for pleasing, should shun, being that which Plato called 'solitariness'; as in the end, all men that are wholly given to a self-opinion and obstinate mind, and who will never yield to other's reason but to their own, remain without company, and forsaken of all men. For a man that will live in the world must needs have patience, which lusty bloods make but a mock at. So Marcius being a stout man of nature, that never yielded in any respect, as one thinking that to overcome always and to have the upper hand in all matters, was a token of magnanimity and of no base and faint courage, which spitteth out anger from the most weak and passioned part of the beast much like the matter of impostume; went home to his house, full freighted with spite and malice against the people."

If Plutarch had been writing of the passionate and uncontrolled Gov-

ernor of North Carolina, could he have described him more aptly?—Charlotte Observer.

We wish to emphasize the one thought in the above, that we heard nothing in the Campaign measuring fully up to the degree of debasement of the Governor's character as manifested by his words and even his deeds since his election. The Christable hope that he was being misrepresented in the campaign was ill bestowed.

FREE SILVER NOT ALL OF IT.

At the Populist National Convention at Nashville, Butlerism seemed not much in evidence. The convention adopted an address to the people in which the committee hit on some good sense.

The address declares against fusion and says free silver will not bring relief until trusts, combines and rings are abolished.

The wonder is that they did not see this long ago, but the greater wonder is that Democratic campaign speeches last fall were so full of wailings over existing evils both natural and produced by unequal legislation with an implied, if not a positively asserted, promise that free coinage would overcome it all and would meet all our wants.

Indications now are that there is a weakening along this line of free silver. If a good thing at all it is certainly not the sum total of good legislation. The pity is that everything was sacrificed for the one consideration and now we are strictly in it.

Surely he voted against Hanna, and the trusts that have been fostered and built up at the expense of the people. Did he? Not much. He didn't vote at all. He dodged, giving the flimsy excuse for doing so that the tariff is "a political foot ball," whatever that may mean.
