PRESIDENT McNEILL HERE.

Speaks of the Firemen's Tournament and Regrets to Find Our Town in Financial Straits.

President J D McNeill, of the State Firemen's Association, was in the city Tuesday afternoon. His business here was to make arrangements to have our firemen meet with the Association in Fayetteville, the first week in August. Mr. McNeill says the meeting this year will be the largest ever held in the State. He was very much surprised to find that a town the size of Concord neglected her firemen as she does. He said, that "Every town and city in the State that had a volunteer fire company, would send their men in a body."

"Salisbury's councilmen have made an appropriation sufficient to bear the expenses of her entire department, if it chooses to go. It is to be regretted that Concord is in such financial straits that she cannot send her men."

It was Mr. McNeill's first visit to Concord since 1865, when he was here with President Jeff. Davis. He was one of the young volunteer soldiers of North Carolina's brave men. Himself and two others stayed all night at the home of Mr. R W Allison.
