### MAD DOG KILLED.

**Thomas H Barringer Its Slayer—Was Almost Dead—Head Taken to Baltimore.**

The dog that has terrorized eastern Cabarrus with its vicious attacks during the past week, was killed in this city Friday evening about 8 o'clock. The dog was first discovered near A E Lan Z's residence about 6 o'clock Friday morning, and chased across town to Church street where it eluded its pursuers. Late in the evening the dog was found under the Caton cottage on Church street. Several attempts were made to chase the dog out of its hiding place, but it had run itself down and was weakened in the last stages of life, when Mr. Thomas H Barringer appeared upon the scene and ended its earthly career by pouring two loads of hot lead into the body of the writhing brute.

Master Robert Barrier who was bitten by a dog Sunday last and who was in the city on his way to Baltimore, was summoned to view the remains of the dead dog and he positively identified the dog as being the one that attacked himself and others at his home on Sunday last, and upon his statement the head of the dog was amputated, picked in ice and taken to Baltimore. Mr. Frank Barrier, an uncle of Robert Barrier, accompanied the dog to Baltimore. The general opinion of those who saw the dog before it was killed is that it would have died before morning, although when shot it made a desperate struggle for life.

About two hours later a white man appeared at his store, and claimed the chickens, saying that he could swear that they were his, and that they had been stolen yesterday morning. The police were notified, and were soon on the hunt for the thief. Chief Orr and Officer Jetton traced him through fourth ward, hearing here and there of his selling a chicken, but they never could catch up with him. The party who owned the chickens was Mr. J P Morrison, who lives just this side of Concord. He and Mr. J W Morris, a neighbor, put out for Charlotte as soon as Mr. Morrison discovered that his coop had been entered. Mr. Morrison has 200 chickens in his poultry yard. He missed quite a number yesterday morning. He found one of his hens at a house in the fourth ward, and two more at Mr. Scott's. Mr. Scott had paid 40 cents apiece for the hens. As he wanted to keep them, he paid Mr. Morrison 40 cents apiece for them, making \$1.60 the chickens cost him. The negro he bought them from was accompanied by another negro. Both had on sweaters. The police were trying to identify them by the sweaters, but failed.—Charlotte Observer.

### Potato Crop Stolen.

Thursday night, thieves went to the garden of Mr. Gowan Dusenbury and relieved it of a nice lot of fine potatoes. The vines in the patch were pulled off and the rows grabbed.
