Soldiers' Day Will be Observed—Preparations for the Occasion—Everything in Perfect Readiness—March at 10 O'clock From Court House.

Our office attaches naturally desire to join in the gayeties of reunion day. It is but noble and right that they should and therefore the DAILY STANDARD will issue at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning instead of in the evening. Promptly at 9:30 o'clock tomorrow morning the old soldiers, their wives, sons and daughters will assemble at the court house, in front of the Confederate monument, and form a line of march, preceded by the band, etc., as per programme.

Large tables have been constructed in the court house yard with a capacity sufficient for all to be comfortably placed at the dinner hour, when the spread will score a feature. Already old Veterans are beginning to arrive from a distance. A large crowd is expected and tomorrow will mark a red-letter day for Cabarrus Veterans, their comrades and descendants.

The ladies beg that all those who will kindly give baskets for the old soldiers, will send them to the court house at nine or ten o'clock tomorrow morning, where the ladies will receive them. They also ask us to say that there may be some whom the young ladies who solicited baskets may not have seen, and they hope one and all will give to this noble cause.

We are authorized to invite, even to urge, all the bicyclists to be on hand tomorrow at the forming of the procession at 10 o'clock to take their places in the line, with their wheels decorated.

The city firemen also will be in full uniform and participate in the parade.

The firemen request us also to say that their hall will be open for all who wish to rest and enjoy its comforts.

While at the depot, he conversed with a STANDARD reporter about railroad matters, and among the things that he said, was to the effect that he had appeared, on one or more occasions, before the railroad commissioners of the State and asked them to look after the interest of Concord and Cabarrus people in regard to railroad accommodations at this point.

The commission advised Mr. Hileman to suggest to the people that if a petition bearing the names of a number of our business men and citizens in general was presented in a formal way to the railroad authorities, the matter would receive prompt consideration.
