The Reidsville Boys Go Home—Salisbury Wants a Game.

The Reidsville baseball team passed through last night returning home. They went to Concord yesterday morning to play the boys of that place two games, but were sufficiently amused with yesterday's game, and decided to go back home. Passed Over the River.

Mr. John Saunders died at his home at Cabarrus Mills this morning at 4 o'clock. The deceased has been in feeble health for a year or more and the end has been looked for.

He leaves a widow and five children, one daughter unmarried.

Mr. Saunders was a consistent member of the Methodist church and died in triumphant hope of the new and better life.

He was 66 years of age. The funeral services were held at 4 o'clock at the family home by Rev. McGee, and the remains were laid to rest in the old Lutheran cemetery.
