RIOT AMOMG MINERS.

A Bloody Battle-Nine Men Fatally Injured and Two Score More Seriously Wounded-An Outcome of the Hazelton Trouble.

Girardville, Pa., September 27 .-At least nine men received fatal injuries and possibly two score others were more or less seriously wounded in a bloody riot here late last night and early this morning. The battle was the outcome of a quarrel over the Hazelton troubles. Thirty-six men are known to have been wounded, and about fifty more are being secreted by their friends through fright that they will be sent to jail.

The story of the riot is is as follows: Several hundred' Polanders boarded at William Culacabbage's hotel, on Second street. Joseph Cavendish is proprietor of a hotel at the east end of the town, where several hundred more Polanders make their headquarters. 
