## CORONER WALTER DEAD.

The County Official Expired at his Home on Corbin Street at 3 O'clock This Morning.

Coroner George M. Walter is dead. The esteemed county official expired at his home on West Corbin street at 3 o'clock this (Wednesday) morning, after an illness of several weeks of typhoid fever.

Deceased was about 65 years of age, and had been a resident of this city for about two years, moving here with his family from his plantation in No. 5 township.

Mr. Walter was a good substantial citizen and was highly esteemed by all of his acquaintances.

The remains of the deceased man will be interred at Mt. Gilead church in No. 5 township tomorrow (Thursday) morning at 11 o'clock, the funeral services to be conducted by Rev. H. A. McCullough.

Mr. Walter was the father of a large family, and leaves a wife and eight children, who survive him.

### Mr. Steele's Statement.

EDITOR STANDARD:—Your article in Monday's paper does me a grave injustice. It would appear from it that I ruthlessly drove to death the horse I had on last Sunday; that I drove a circuitous route from here to Mooresville and back and drove so cruelly hard as to cause the horse's death. The facts in the case are these: I left Concord for Mooresville Sunday morning driving the most direct way I knew and arrived there at 11:40 a. m., nearly 5 hours, which would have been a little over 5 miles an hour. I left there about 2 o'clock and drove beyond the congregation, who were leaving the church, for some miles, and arrived in Concord at about 6 o'clock. These are the facts in the case. Your correspondent undoubtedly drew largely on his imagination for the item as furnished you. The mistake I made and which no one regrets more than I do, both from a humanitarian and financial standpoint, was in watering and feeding the horse immediately on my arrival at Mooresville. The horse died from founder or colic, not from cruel driving.
