**Said About Our Esteemed Citizen, Mr. Louis Duval by the Augusta Chronicle.**

Mr. Louis Duval, who went to Georgia some days ago as noted in THE STANDARD, has returned to his post of duty at the Cannon mills.

We clip the following from the Augusta Chronicle of Sunday in regard to our highly esteemed citizen:

Mr. Louis A Duval, formerly of Augusta, now a resident of Concord, N. C., where he is superintendent of a large cotton mill, was in the city yesterday enroute to Social Circle for which place he left last night at 11:30 o'clock, over the Georgia road. Seven years ago Mr. Duval left Augusta, being then with the Riversides mill, and took the position he now occupies in Concord.

"Mr. Duval is well-known here for this is his native county. He was born near Richmond factory and early became a citizen of Augusta. He studied law and practiced here for some years, which time he most ably represented this county in the legislature, having received a large number of votes when he ran. Later Mr. Duval retired from the practice of law and went into the manufacturing business, accepting a valuable position with the Augusta factory, and going from there to the Riverside mill.

"Mr. Duval loves Augusta greatly and it is with much pleasure that he visited the city again after a long absence. He saw many and handsome improvements, and he says that surely Augusta has a great future before her. Mr. Duval manifested great interest in the campaign now going on here and wished that he were now a citizen of Augusta that he might cast a vote for Hon. Patrick Walsh for mayor. He believes that he is the man for the place and feels sure that Augustians will select none other than Mr. Walsh when the election comes off in December. While in this city Mr. Duval was the guest of Dr. and Mrs. Green and Mr. George Burch. It was a great pleasure to those of his friends who saw him to shake hands with him and there are hundreds of others who will regret that they did not have the opportunity since his visit was so short a one.
