THANKSGIVING.

November 25 is Named by President McKinley in His First Proclamation.

Washington, Oct. 29.—President McKinley today issued his first Thanksgiving Day proclamation as follows:

"In remembrance of God's goodness to us during the past year, which has been so abundant, 'Let us offer unto Him our thanksgiving and pay our vows unto the Most High.' Under His watchful providence industry has prospered, the conditions of labor have been improved, the rewards of the husbandman have been increased and the comforts of our homes multiplied. His mighty hand has preserved peace and protected the nation. Respect for law and order has been strengthened, love of free institutions cherished and all sections of our beloved country brought into closer bonds of fraternal regard and generous co-operation.

For these great benefits it is our duty to praise the Lord in a spirit of humility and gratitude and to offer up to Him our most earnest supplications. That we may acknowledge our obligations as a people to Him who has so graciously granted us the blessings of free government and material prosperity, I, William McKinley, President of the United States, do hereby designate and set apart Thursday, the twenty-fifth day of November, for national thanksgiving and prayer, which all of the people are invited to observe with appropriate religious services in their respective places of worship. On this day of rejoicing and domestic reunion let our prayers ascend to the giver of every good and perfect gift for the continuance of His love and favor to us, that our hearts may be filled with charity and good will, and that we may be ever worthy of His beneficent concern.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. Done at the city of Washington, this twenty-ninth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-second.

The Sufferer Passes Into Rest at 4.30 Sunday Evening.

Mrs. L. D. Duval's spirit took its flight from this earthly tenement at 4.30 p. m., Sunday, the 31st ult. For about 10 years Mrs. Duval has been aware that a malady was destined to rob her of much of life's joys and comforts. For about 18 months her sufferings have come with accelerated intensity, with cessations only sufficient to regain vitality with which to sustain a recurrence.

The end has been looked for and the tenderest affection of nearest and dearest ones could but acquiesce and welcome death as the messenger of mercy. Through the tears of natural bereavement at the departure of one filling the minds and hearts the more by their affectionate ministrations, the loving ones may look up with a measure of comfort that eternal joys have now crowded the life of the departed.

Mrs. Duval took upon herself the vows of consecration to a holy life, and connected herself with the Methodist Episcopal church in early youth, in which she lived a devoted and exemplary life.

In April, 1866, she was united in the sacred bonds of matrimony with him whose name she bore and who now bends under the rod of this affliction.

The deceased was nearing the end of her 55th year of life. She leaves in mutual sorrow a devoted husband, one son and one daughter.

The funeral rites were conducted at the Central M. E. Church at 3 o'clock today, by Rev. Thompson, assisted by Rev. Alexander, and the remains were laid to rest in the Presbyterian cemetery.
