Funny Doings Down at Raleigh.

Our State treasurer, in the administration of his office, could be called a funny man were he not so serious and inconsistent. He refuses to pay a judgment against the State (in the Pamlico oyster cases) in favor of a sheriff and clerk for fees in serving processes in cases brought by the solicitor by direct authority of the legislature. The State lost the cases, and the supreme court has said three times that the State must pay these costs. The treasurer refused to pay a warrant issued in accordance with Supreme court decisions, when he had money in the treasury "not otherwise appropriated." The case was again carried to the supreme court, which again says the treasurer must pay the claim. He now, through the auditor, says there is no money in treasury not otherwise appropriated, and the claimants must wait and apply to the next legislature. It is true there is no money now in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, as the last session legislature appropriated not only all there was, but more than the taxes of the State will put there during these two current years. And while he may be correct now, and justified in referring the oyster claims to the legislature, he finds money in the treasury with which to pay the fusionist Babb for preaching soberness and practicing drunkenness at the penitentiary, also to pay \$132 "for Kentucky whisky for the use of the penitentiary. There was no appropriation made by the last Legislature for the penitentiary. There is no authority of law for one cent of the money in the treasury being used for or by the penitentiary. There is not the excuse of simply anticipating an appropriation as has sometimes been done. Yet the treasurer without warrant of law, or the color of law, has advanced thousands of dollars to help run Governor Russell's disgracefully mismanaged institution, and continues to pay out money contrary to law for drunken populist preaching and whisky enough to make all hands drunk—at State's expense.

New what is funny and may become serious is, how can Treasurer Worth reconcile his paying out money without any authority when he has not, "in law," got any, to the penitentiary, and refuse to pay a just claim against the State after the Supreme Court has said for the third time he must pay it? How can he find money for the one and not the other?

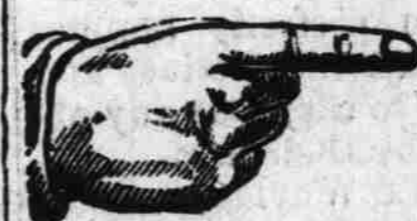
