GETS HIM ANOTHER MAN.

Postmaster Gregory Succeeds in Detecting Something Wrong in the Mail Services at Powellsville.

For quite a while Postoffice Inspector Gregory has been suspecting something wrong in the Mail services at Powellsville, in Bertie county. On Thursday, November 4th, he began an investigation, which resulted in his taking into custody Luther A. Wynn, assistant postmaster at that place for the embezzlement of valuable letters, the money from two letters being found on his person. In August, Mrs. Gaston Morris was succeeded as postmaster at Powellsville by Emma Wynn, a young negro woman, who appointed her brother, Luther, as assistant postmaster, who, since being placed in the postoffice, continued to perform the duties of the office, being alone in the office a good portion of the time, during the temporary absence of his sister. The gentleman plead guilty to the charge and was committed to jail in default of a \$500 bond to await trial in the United States court at Raleigh on December 7.

They have bought and paid for a new organ, and the preacher that the approaching conference sends will find a well-organized, hopeful, working people. I was much pleased with one feature of the pastor's work. He has a class of little folks that meet him at the parsonage on one night in each week, and he instructs them in the catechism. I think there are 60 or 70 in this class. There have been considerable additions to the church during the year. I understand that between \$400 and \$500 have been expended on their church and parsonage in improvements. Their purpose is to go up to conference next week with a clean sheet and all assessments paid. This pastor and congregation have worthily won this word of commendation.

We notice that the sheriff of Rowan county has collected about twice as much as has been collected in our county, but when we look at Rowan's situation in regard to the paying of her taxes it changes the face of things considerably. The court in that county convenes on the 22nd day of this month, which is the time that delinquents will be reported, while in our county the court will not convene until in the latter part of next January. There is one thing certain in regard to the taxes this year, as we have said before, and that is that there is an abundance of taxes already paid this year that in former years would remain on the books until the last chance to pay.
