NOT TO PROSECUTE.

Will Wait Until the Supreme Court Tests the Matter of Delinquent Tax Payers.

The court now in session will not prosecute delinquent tax payers.

Hon. Theo. F. Klutz presented the subject to Judge Coble immediately on the convening of court this afternoon.

Section 52 and 53 of the Revenue act of 1897 were read.

The judge appeared silent as to the law and deferred giving his opinion until the test case now pending before the Supreme court has been decided. Solicitor Holton said privately that he would not prosecute any one until the test case is settled. He said publicly that he was inclined to continue the matter.

This practically settles the question as to the indictment of delinquent tax payers.—Salisbury Sun.

Died of Paralysis.
