## SOUTHERN'S "MONSTER"

Will Be Used Between Spencer and Alexandria.

The Charlotte News of Monday says of it:

"Engine No. 325, one of the huge 'monarchs' of the rail that the Southern has had on exhibition at the Nashville Exposition, passed through Charlotte this morning on its way to Spencer, where it will be fired up in a few days and will be placed in active service on this company's line between Spencer, N. C. and Monroe, Va.

The builders of this engine claim that it is one of the largest in the world. The Southern has purchased four of them and they will all soon be running over this line. They are the most powerful engines ever built and are said to be able to pull 33 Pullman coaches with ease."

The News is in error as to from what points the engine will be run. It will first run between Alexandria and Monroe. It was built by the Baldwin company and when its two companions—one now completed, the other in course of construction by the Richmond Locomotive Works—are ready for use all three will be run between Spencer and Monroe. We are reliably informed as to this fact.—Salisbury Sun.
