THE PROGRAM.

Gen. Olingman's Remains to Be Interred Tuesday Next.

Col. J M Ray, chief marshal of the day for the exercises incident to the interment of Gen. Thomas L Olingman's remains in Riverside cemetery, issues a cordial invitation to all civic bodies, fraternal societies and the fire department of the city to participate in the exercises of this occasion. These organizations are requested to report to Maj. White G Smith, Col. Ray's chief of staff, as soon as possible, that the order of parade may be made up.

The Asheville Light Infantry will have position in the column, and the Richland Rifle, of Waynesville, have accepted an invitation to participate. It is also probable that the Bingham cadets will take part.

The exercises will occur next Tuesday, the 7th, about 10 a. m. Although the details have not been completed, it has been arranged that the parade will form on Church street, marching thence to the court house, directly in front of which the casket will rest. The opening service will be conducted by Rev. Dr. J S Felix, pastor of the First Baptist church. Following this, addresses will be made by Col. A T Davidson, Col. V S Lusk and Col. Wm. H S Burgwyn.

The column will then form and proceed to Riverside cemetery, where a salute will be fired. The service at the grave will be conducted by Rev. McNeely DuBose, rector of Trinity Episcopal church.

These are the arrangements to be carried out if the weather be good. In case the weather should be unfavorable, the exercises will occur in the courtroom.

The presidents of the various labor organizations of the city will meet at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening in Central labor union hall, the object of the meeting being to discuss the plan of having all the labor unions represented at the funeral of General Olingman.

Commander Marcus Erwin, of Johnston Pettigrew camp, Sons of Confederate Veterans, requests that all members of the camp who can do so be present to take part in the funeral exercises.—Asheville Citizen.

The Chainless Bicycle.

Today it was our pleasure to see the chainless bicycle, which was brought here by Mr. Hume, agent for the Pope Manufacturing Company, who are the manufacturers of the Columbia wheel. It was on exhibition at the store of Messrs. Swink & White, who have taken the agency for this city.

At the first glance one could not notice any change from other wheels, there being only a slight change in the frame bar on one side leading from the crank shaft to the axle of the hind wheel, or rather, a connecting shaft runs through the frame instead of a chain.

The bearings are made dust-proof, overcoming the prevalent grinding of the chain on dusty roads, tightening on slightly muddy roads, and rusting after getting wet.

Chief Boger asked "Coot" to let him see his socks that he had on, and they were found to be entirely new and of the brand that was stolen. He was arrested and tried before Esquire Pitts, and in default of a \$200 bond, he goes to jail to await the next term of court.

Pants Factory Caught Fire.

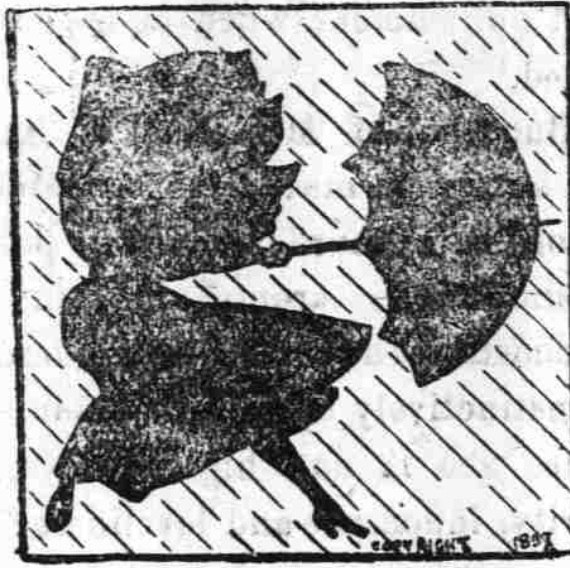
