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ANOTHER MURDER

In Rowan County—Some Relation to Mr. Joel Reid, of This City.

Hardly has the talk ceased of the killing affair at the Rowan county chain gang until we see from the Salisbury papers that there has still been another one, which was committed near Mauney's mill, in the eastern part of the county. The men killed was Mr. Mias Reid, whose father is a nephew of M. Wm. Reid, of Salisbury, and also of Mr. Joel Reid, of this city. The circumstances of the murder seem to be that Mr. Reid was returning home from his father's house and was closely followed by one Thomas Broadaway, a notoriously bad character, and when Reid was near his home Broadaway pulled a pistol and fired two shots at him. At the firing of the second shot Reid fell, and before a doctor could get to him he was dead. Mr. Reid was about twenty-five years of age and leaves a wife and one child.

This Mr. Reid, when a young man, lived in Mt. Pleasant, and is remembered by the people in that part of the county. About fifteen years ago his father, Mr. Wm. Reid, was engaged in the mercantile business in the firm known then as Kindley, Tucker & Reid.

CITY FATHERS MEET.

Routine Business Transacted and Several Other Important Things.

The City Fathers met last night in regular session, closing the year's official labors.

Mr. J W Cannon presented the bill for the electric lights from Dec. 1st, 1896, to Dec. 1st, 1897, which was ordered paid, subject to adjustments for failure of service.

The work of the committee with reference to South Main street was approved and confirmed.

The work of the committee in laying off street in Love Town was confirmed. This street, beginning in rear of Mr. D P Dayvault's run in the direction of Smith's Grove, then bends in the direction of the fair ground and stops in the Coleman property.

The resignation of Policeman Penninger, of Forest Hill, was tendered and accepted.

In order to make the city hall comfortable in winter it was ordered to put in two new doors—one at the stairway leading up to the hall of the Knights of Pythias, and the other leading to the firemen's hall.

It was ordered that the mayor have the large tree removed from the Lumber corner.

Mr. W A Smith offered to sell to the town the large street roller. The proposition was referred to the road committee.

Wm. Johnston, executor of W R Johnston, deceased, of Charlotte, demanded the redemption of \$300 in town scrip held as assets of the deceased. The matter was referred to the committee on city finances.
