Tax Valuation of Railroads in North Carolina.

The latest report of the Railroad Commission shows the following tax valuation of railroads in this State:

Atlantic Coast line, 725 miles, value \$6,484,000; value of rolling stock \$727,000, other property \$192,000. Seaboard Air Line, 670 miles, value \$5,079,000; rolling stock \$448,000, other property \$110,000. Miscellaneous roads, 1,220 miles, value \$5,038,407, rolling stock \$669,000, other property \$163,000. Southern railway, 1,100 miles; value, \$8,091,000; rolling stock \$1,097,000, other property, \$164,000.

The report also shows that the Atlantic Coast Line has in this State 2,961 employes, the Southern 2,674, the Seaboard Air Line 2,408, and miscellaneous roads 2,201.—Henderson Gold Leaf.
