The President's message asks Congress to authorizs the President to take measures to secure termination of hostilities in Cuba, and to secure the establishment of a stable government, and to use the military and naval powers of the United States that may be necessary for hese purposes.
The President says the only hope for relief from a condition that can be no longer endured is the enforced pacification on the island.

He does not however think it would be wise ur pradent to recog. nize the independence of the so called Ouban repabic. The issue is now with Congress and he awaits its action, atanding prepared to carry out every obligation imposed on him by the Constitution.
Spain's decree for a suspension of Lostilities is submitted to Congrese for just and carefol attention with the observation that if the Spanish measares attaina successfal result then our aspirations as a pac loving people will be realized.
If it fails it will only be another justification for our contemplated a thion.
