### LET US NOT FUSE.

Amid all the excitement about the apparently inevitable war, as time steals on we must turn away and give some attention to our home affairs.

Mr. A B Young, the Chairman of the County Democratic executive Committee's call for convention is issued. The State Convention to nominate congressmen, judges, etc., will meet in Raleigh on the 26th of May.

That spectre fusion has again arisen and the consideration must be entered into.

THE STANDARD has been clearly and unequivocally opposed to any fusion and it sees no reason justifying a change of front.

The one apparently unavoidable condition of fusion between the Democratic party and Populist party is to largely follow the lead of Marion Butler. This renders the whole proposition of fusion preposterous and not to be entertained by most Democrats. If North Carolina has reared a son more fatal to peace, good will, her good name and tranquil prosperity in the State since the checkered days of her colonial history, with the one exception of W W Holden, than this man Butler we know not of it.

The appearance of his lost hold on the Populist leadership is not an assured reality by any means.

(Indeed it seems that Mr. Bryan is so wrapped up in this character vilifier that to repudiate Butler would be to let down Mr. Bryan.) If we must fuse with the Populists to keep them from fusing with the Republicans, there is little to promise ourselves in the association, even with Butler discarded (and he wont submit to being discarded.)

With due deference to more sagacious politicians than THE STANDARD claims to be, it can see no valid excuse to enter into any fusion trading.

It is plead that many of our very best citizens in the county and State are Populists. This very fact, which we admit as a fact, furnishes the strongest reason why they should leave their associations and come boldly into the open front door to the only party in the State that offers no associations and an efficient power for good.

But it is said they are dignified, gentlemanly characters and should not be humiliated. We answer that their own acts of fusion with the Republican party has brought the blush of shame at the consequences.

We sympathize with them in the humiliation attending the consequences and we inflict no humiliations when we invite them into our primaries to help name our standard bearers, on no conditions but that of voting the Democratic ticket there made up.

We can see no reason for the separate organization of a third party in the State. Whatever may have been the supposed necessity for its existence at one time it has outlived its mission for good. It can only exist now as a lash to drive one or the other of the stable parties into giving office to characters that can't obtain them in a fair open field.

We cannot conceive, too, of gentlemen, of high tone and conspicuous virtue, flopping from side to side to parties whose tenets and whose achievements are so opposite, all for the biggest piece of 'pie' held out as a bid.

We can see nothing more in the proposed fusion and if catered to now it will be to repeat again and again with the body politic growing more and more leprous all the while.

Let the Democratic party stand firm and draw to her the desirable element and submit to whatever evil combination that may yet defeat her. We will command respect if worthy of it, and will regain power when the course of degradation and shame has been run.

The cause of free coinage cannot suffer in Democratic triumph, for the party will send no other persuasion to Congress. If defeated let the silver cause be defeated by its own champions the Populists in their combination with its opposers.

The Democrats will send none but silver advocates to Congress. The Republicans will send only gold standard Congressmen.

The Democrats will not place negroes in office over the whites in the State, the Republicans will. It should not be hard for men to make their choice if 'pie' is eliminated from their politics.
