TROOPS LANDED IN CUBA.

TWO COMPANIES OF UNITED STATES SOLDIERS HAVE ALREADY ARRIVED--RIOTING GOING ON IN ITALY--SECOND ATTEMPT TO POISON TROOPS AT ATLANTA.

Reported That Sampson Has Been Ordered to Return to Key West--Also Reported That the Spanish Fleet Has Left Cadiz.

Rioting Renewed.

Madrid, May 11, 11:40 a. m.—The rioting was renewed this morning. It is reported that the Cape Verde fleet has returned and is expected to give battle to Sampson.

A Second Attempt to Poison.

Atlanta, May 11, 11:40 a. m.—A second attempt to poison the Infantry in camp here was discovered this morning. The poison used is arsenic submerged in bags placed in the stream from which the soldiers drink.

Landed in Cuba.

Key West, May 11, 11:55 a. m.—Two companies of regulars landed in Cuba this morning.

Riots in Italy.

Rome, May 11, 11:55 a. m.—Bloody riots are raging in Como and Navara.

The Powers Want to Stop Spain.

Washington, May 11, 11:55 a. m.—The ambassadors are considering the matter of forcing Spain to sue for peace. They propose for Spain to relinquish Cuba and pay heavy indemnity. It is reported that Sampson has been ordered to return to Key West to co-operate in landing troops.

THE PHASES CHANGED.

Spanish Fleet Gone—Cuba Now to Be Invaded—Troops Hurried Southward—27 Vessels Chartered—The Two Prizes of Tuesday.

The situation has a very different phase now from that presented a few days ago.

There was clamoring "before the war" that the United States should intercept the Spanish Flotilla and not allow it to reach Cuban water. Within the last week that fleet was reported as heading this way in earnest and was even reported to be nearing Porto Rico. Admiral Sampson struck out to meet it and test the matter of the mastery of the Cuban waters.

No one knows the result of a passage at arms before hand and we were on the tiptoe of resistless anxiety to know the result, but like the experience of many a soldier in our great war who was rushed out of camp to engage in battle on short notice only to find the enemy gone, so Admiral Sampson found nothing to fight when he arrived.

Now the logical and apparently progressing plan is to invade Cuba. To this end the government has chartered 27 merchant steamers, estimated to carry 20,000 troops.

The troops at Chicamauga are ordered to Tampa quickly, as also the First N. C. Regiment. It is a recognized fact that the National Guards are not as well drilled as might be desired but the regulars will doubtless be depended upon for the most responsible service. The operations, doubtless, will proceed with the greatest possible dispatch.

Of the two vessels captured Tuesday, one, the Fernandito was Spanish but the other, the Bratsburg, was Norwegian, and may, like the LaFayette, be turned loose, though she may be found to have unloaded her cargo of cattle in Cuba. If so she may not be released very easily.

The Spanish are very active in fortifying, throwing up their earth works at night. It is rather a matter of amusement for the blockading vessels to drop a shell in amongst squads that they find.

A little tilt took place Monday at Cardenas that was not of the very least importance. The little torpedo boat, Winslow, ventured pretty far into the bay when she was fired upon and pursued by two small Spanish boats. She returned the fire and thinks she saw splinters fly but hastened to get under the protecting care of the Machias, which was further out. The Winslow was not hit but she made the important discovery that the bay is mined. It is believed too, that this will be the place of landing troops instead of Matanzas.
