THE SECOND TO MUSTER OUT

The Orders Issued Friday For This to Take Place at Raleigh.

A special to the Charlotte Observer from Washington, dated Sept. 2nd, says: Orders were issued today for the mustering out of the Second North Carolina Regiment now at St. Simon's Island, Ga. The papers of the regiment will be examined and the command sent to Raleigh in a few days. On arrival there 30 day furloughs will be issued to the men. All furloughs will be made to expire the same day, and any one failing to report at Raleigh on that day will be considered a deserter. No traveling expenses will be allowed the men who go to their homes, but they will receive commutation on furlough rations at the rate of 25 cents each day. Sufficient details of men will be retained in Raleigh to guard government property and assist in clerical work of winding up the regiment's affairs.

At the muster-out the men will be examined physically in a most thorough manner. They will then receive all the pay and allowances due them.
