Not only have her men of means invested in mills and mill machinery, but her up. young men, without capital, with brawn and brain, have worked their way onward and upward.

"Among those who deserve mer tion is Robert F Coble, now superintendent of the Odell Mills, Concord, N. C. As a spinner boy, Mr. Coble began his mill career at Naomi Falls, in Randolph county, when not more than twelve years old. A widowed mother and three sisters were dependent, to a certain year 1884 he came to Concord and entered the weaving department of the Odell mill. Two years later he was promoted to the position of loom fixer. His attention to duty made him a favorite with the owners, and from time to time promotions came unasked for until at last he was made overseer of No. 4 mill with its 1,000 looms. This position he has held with credit to himself and profit to his employers until the resignation of F L Robbins made vacant the superintendency. 
