CABARRUS PUTS ON HER NEW POLITICAL DRESS.

OVERWHELMING VICTORY.

December Will Bring About an Upheaval From Constables to Congressmen—A Quiet Election—State Goes Democratic By an Immense Majority.

We have met the enemy and they are ours!

Cabarrus county on Tuesday, Nov. 8th, threw off her fusion robe and will now don Democracy's attire, which attire has for four years past been lying away to again be brought out and worn probably for quite a long duration of time.

In the coming December, the county officers now in charge of our affairs will bid farewell to the walls of the old court house, with their remembrance of past days.

This was an exceptionally quiet election and all went lovely, there being but very little rowdyism and no difficulties were reported. Quite a large crowd hovered around the headquarters in the court house to avail themselves of the news. After finding what the result would be the most of them returned to their homes to either have a sweet rest or else ponder over the result.

As the vote of the coroner, surveyor, magistrates and commissioners would coincide with the vote of the more prominent offices, we did not deem it necessary to take down their vote, but suffice it to say that they go in by a large majority.

As near as we can reckon it at this time, 3 o'clock Wednesday morning, the majority of our county officers will be nearly 600 and one will make at least 625 majority. This shows our election to be an overwhelming victory, and one for which the citizens of Cabarrus county should indeed be proud.
