A mass meeting of the foremost cutizens and prominent business me was held in the court house Wedness day at noon. Thy meeting adopted resolutions fiving the negro Manly, editor of the Record, twenty four bours to get out of town, and the resignation of Melton was demanded.
Before going to press thia afteru poon we are informed by the Char lotie Observer of the following:
This (Thursday) merning at 7:30 ,'clock (the time fixed) six hundred white men invaded the office of the Record, a negro newspaper, and dcy stroyed its contente, demolishing the press and firing the building. The building is partially barned, and the place is now a total wreck.
The negro editor, Manly, was nowhere to be seen and it is thought that he has skipped for good.
Ool. Waddell was the leader of the crowd, but it was not his intention to burn the bailding. It was very probably fired by parties that were so highly wrought up over the mat-

After the above bappened the ne groes have shown a diaposition to resent the white people and a rio followed, the result being four ne groes and two white men killed. Is was first reported that fiye negroes and one white men were killed.
Lest it would prove dangerous to neighboring towns in that part of the State, help was called for from Cbarlotte and Goldsboro. There is no danger bat that there will be a good crowd going from Charlotto
Gatling gans have been placed in pition. All of the blaced in closed and all basiness suspended. All of the inhabitants are out on the streets, arned with Winchester rifles. Even ministers are in the orowd bat are not taking a part.
Still later we learn that the Nava Reserves $\bar{v}$ 'succeeded in running the negroes from the subarbs of the city. Special trains have been run from Hamlet and will very probably be run from Greensboro and Fayette ville.
