## SIX LIVES LOST.

The Terrible State of Affairs In Wilmington Must Cease.

The Record Office Is Burned to the Ground and the Contents Destroyed—Manly Is Nowhere to Be Found—All Business Is Suspended—Gatling Guns Now in Position—Help Is Called For.

A mass meeting of the foremost citizens and prominent business men was held in the court house Wednesday at noon. The meeting was an orderly one, but those present were fully determined to do their duty. The meeting adopted resolutions giving the negro Manly, editor of the Record, twenty-four hours to get out of town, and the resignation of Mayor Wright and Chief of Police Melton was demanded.

Before going to press this afternoon we are informed by the Charlotte Observer of the following:

This (Thursday) morning at 7:30 o'clock (the time fixed) six hundred white men invaded the office of the Record, a negro newspaper, and destroyed its contents, demolishing the press and firing the building. The building is partially burned, and the place is now a total wreck.

The negro editor, Manly, was nowhere to be seen and it is thought that he has skipped for good.

Col. Waddell was the leader of the crowd, but it was not his intention to burn the building. It was very probably fired by parties that were so highly wrought up over the matter.

After the above happened the negroes have shown a disposition to resent the white people and a riot followed, the result being four negroes and two white men killed. It was first reported that five negroes and one white man were killed.

Least it would prove dangerous to neighboring towns in that part of the State, help was called for from Charlotte and Goldsboro. There is no danger but that there will be a good crowd going from Charlotte.

Gatling guns have been placed in position. All of the stores have been closed and all business suspended. All of the inhabitants are out on the streets, armed with Winchester rifles. Even ministers are in the crowd, but are not taking a part.

Still later we learn that the Naval Reserves have succeeded in running the negroes from the suburbs of the city. Special trains have been run from Hamlet and will very probably be run from Greensboro and Fayetteville.

## MRS. MARGARET BARRIER DEAD.

The Aged Mother Passes Away Suddenly of Heart Disease.

Mrs. Margaret Barrier, relict of the late Daniel Barrier, of near Mt. Pleasant, died Tuesday evening at the home of Mrs. M E Welsh in Mt. Pleasant. The deceased was ninety-four years of age. Recently she has suffered from some heart malady and the end, though not looked for

at the moment, was not entirely unexpected.

Mrs. Barrier was the mother of seven living children, viz: Mrs. L A Lentz, of Norwood; Mrs. W M Miller, of Jefferson, S. C.; Mrs. M E Welsh, Mr. D D Barrier, Mrs. Dr. W S Bowman, Mrs. O G Heilig and Mr. George Barrier, all of Mt. Pleasant. One son, Mr. L W Barrier, died just at manhood.

The deceased was a good, kind and indulgent mother, a consistent, devoted and faithful member of the Lutheran branch of the Christian church and a friend and neighbor, loved and esteemed by all. She doubtless enjoyed to a rare degree the freedom from an earthly enemy.

Her funeral was conducted at Holy Trinity church today, (Thursday) at 11 o'clock by her pastor, Rev. Z A Linn, and the remains were laid to rest by those of her late husband in the Lutheran cemetery. Her husband preceded her to the grave nearly twelve years.

We join a large circle of friends and relatives in condolence to the bereaved family while we take pleasure in reflecting that the dear mother was not taken from them till all had arrived at mature years.

## OVER SEVEN HUNDRED

Was the Highest Democratic Majority Made in Cabarrus in the Election—The Calculators of Both Parties Were Actually Surprised—Each Township Gave a Larger Democratic Majority Than Was Expected.

It will be remembered that when THE STANDARD issued its morning edition at daylight Wednesday morning, two townships, Nos. 9 and 10, had not been officially heard from, but the best of calculators had said that No. 9 would give us 90 majority, while we would lose 30 majority in No. 10. No. 9 township afterwards brought in her report showing us to have about 88 majority, but No. 10 township's official report fooled us badly. Instead of going against us they sent us a nice majority, averaging about 23.

The following majorities were made by our different candidates: Judges 643, Rush 677, Klutz 624, Smith 644, Hartell 629, Cook 670, Peck 502, Johnson 543, Propst 650, Swink 644, Long 711, Allison 670, Nesbit 647, Turner 657, Lentz 616. These are "Democratic lies."

Dr. H C Herring was elected the constable for No. 12 township on last Tuesday. The following men were elected Squires: A M Brown, Dr. W C Huston, W P Hornbuckle, G T Crowell, Chas. F Hislop, H McNamara, Jno. A Cline, W J Hill, and Jno. A Kimmons.

## TEN NEGROES KILLED.

A Riot Occurs at Greenwood, S. C. Resulting in the Killing of Ten Negroes—Positive Evidence Against the Persons Killed.

A riot occurred at Greenwood, S C, Thursday between the white people and negroes, caused by the killing of two white men.

One of the negroes was stood in front of a crowd and shot about 100 times. Three more were afterwards found and were riddled with bullets. There seems to have been no doubt but that the negroes were connected with the crime.

From the Charlotte Observer this (Thursday) afternoon we are informed that there have been ten negroes killed now instead of four, as was first reported.
