The Terrible State of Affairs In Wilmington Must Cease.

The Record Office Is Burned to the Ground and the Contents Destroyed-Maniy Is Nowhere to Be Found-All Business Is Suspended-Gatling Guns Now in Position-Help Is Call-

ed For.

A mass meeting of the foremost citizens and prominent business men was held in the court house Wedness day at noon. The meeting was an orderly one, but those present were fully determined to do their duty. The meeting adopted resolutions giving the negro Manly, editor of the Record, twenty-four hours to get Mayor Wright and Chief of Police ly twelve years. Melton was demanded.

Before going to press this afternoon we are informed by the Charlotte Observer of the following:

This (Thursday) merning at 7:30 o'clock (the time fixed) six hundred white men invaded the office of the Record, a negro newspaper, and dev stroyed its contents, demolishing the press and firing the building. The building is partially burned, and the place is now a total wreck.

The negro editor, Manly, was nowhere to be seen and it is thought that he has skipped for good.

Col. Waddell was the leader of the crowd, but it was not his intention to burn the building. It was very probably fired by parties that were so highly wrought up over the mat-

After the above happened the ne groes have shown a disposition to resent the white people and a riot followed, the result being four negroes and two white men killed. I was first reported that five negroes and one white men were killed,

Lest it would prove dangerous to neighboring towns in that part of the State, help was called for from Charlotte and Goldsboro. There is no danger but that there will be a good crowd going from Charlotte.

Gatling guns have been placed in position. All of the stores have been closed and all business suspended. All of the inhabitants are out on the streets, armed with Winchester rifles. but are not taking a part.
