THE STORM'S WORK.

More Dreadful Yet—The Portland Lost With Its 99 Souls.

The worst of the story of Saturday and Sunday's storm was not at first more than feared. These fears are but stern realities. The Portland was lost it seems beyond a doubt with not one of the 51 passengers or the 48 members of the crew left to tell the sad story. One body has come ashore at Cape Cod with a life belt on which is the name "Steamer Portland." The coasts along from Connecticut are strewn with wrecks, some of which are ground to unrecognizable identity. Bodies come ashore stripped of clothing.

The life-saving crews saved many lives but could not rescue all.

It was a calamity dreadful to contemplate.

A Little Child Gets Burned.

On Tuesday night when the children of Mr. and Mrs. R A Brower were in the room playing, a sash around the waist of their four-year-old boy caught fire. The flame quickly caught his clothing, but Mrs. Brower got to him in time to save him from being fatally burned. The little child's hands and face, together with one ear, was somewhat badly burned, as was also the hands of Mrs. Brower, who ran to his rescue.

The Treaty to Be Signed This Week.

Decided progress is reported from Paris in the work of the peace commission. The secretaries had the articles of treaty drawn up Tuesday evening to be presented for final adjustment. It is believed that it will be signed yet this week.

The possession of Qiam, one of the Ladroneas, is in the ultimatum, but the United States wishes in the treaty to obtain Strong Island, one of the Caroline Islands, at a price for a coaling station. No pressure will be brought to bear on Spain in this matter. She will have her own option and will have a good chance to show her temper.

Spain will give up her insurgent prisoners on the condition that the United States undertake to effect the release of the prisoners in the hands of Aguinaldo.

He Makes It By Steam.

Mr. Sol Levy, one of our butchers, has added a new equipment to his meat market. It is a 4-horse power engine, together with a fine meat cutter, which capacity is 500 pounds per hour. It certainly cuts meat in a hurry.

Another Gale Blowing.

New York, Nov. 29.—The storm of Sunday, which wrought such terrible havoc to shipping, seems likely to be duplicated. It is snowing again tonight and stormy weather prevails over a large area. A severe northeast gale is sweeping down the coast.

Telegraphic communication with remote points on Long Island was resumed today and many tales of shipwrecks and disaster came in. Northport harbor is strewn with wreckage, not one of the fleet of craft moored there having escaped. The hulls of two schooners lie on shore of Centerport harbor while Sag Harbor shows the same results of the storm's ravage. At Port Jefferson several lives were lost.

Mail Carrier Attacked In Rowan.

The following is taken from the Salisbury correspondence to the Observer:

"With blood coursing down his cheeks and his right hand almost battered into a piece of raw flesh, John Earnhardt, a mail driver, came to Salisbury Tuesday evening about 7 o'clock with a stirring encounter to relate. Earnhardt carries the mail from Salisbury to Pool and was on his return trip home, and about two miles from town, when a negro jumped out at his horse's head. He grasped the horse's bridle and commanded Mr. Earnhardt to hand over the mail bags. This Uncle Sam's agent refused to do, and the negro grabbed at the bag himself. Mr. Earnhardt was unarmed and a hand-to-hand conflict followed. The plucky mail carrier succeeded in downing his adversary and was astride of him, when his horse began to walk away. At this juncture Mr. Earnhardt ran after his horse and the negro escaped. The would-be robber was not known by Mr. Earnhardt and there is no clue as to his identity."

The Third Still Troublesome.

The Third North Carolina regiment is again in it for trouble. It was rumored in Macon, Tuesday night, that they intended to break through the lines and destroy the city.

It came about by an incident that occurred in which one of their members was shot and will probably die. He went to a bar and called for a drink. He was told that only white people could get drinks there. He made himself very offensive till he received a blow with a bottle. He went away and soon returned with several others, in an attacking manner, and was shot by the proprietor, W S Simmons. Mr. Simmons shot to save his brother, whom he considered in great danger from the attack. Simmons is in jail, but this does not satisfy the negroes, who would inaugurate anarchy if they could.

The Tolberts Returning Home.

From the Charlotte News, we see that Messrs. R R and Jas. R Tolbert, the two white men who it is claimed caused the riot at Greenwood, S C., passed through Charlotte Monday night, returning to their homes after staying in Washington some time. They would not talk about the affair.
