It was ordered that the chain gang, now working on the Beatty's Ford road, be moved to the new big road by Rimer, in Nos. 5 and 6 township.

The annual amount of receipts and disbursements for the past year was ordered to be printed, and the copy was ordered to be sent to the printers at once.

A number of applications for keeper of the county home, superintendent of chain gang, and guards on chain gang were handed in, and will be considered next Monday. REV. J. D. REDWINE DEAD.

The Venerable Local Minister Yields to Lung Disease—An Exemplary Man—Leaves an Only Daughter.

Rev. Jno. D. Redwine, one of the most venerable and most beloved citizens of No. 7 township, died at an early hour Monday morning.

An affection of the lungs admonished him that the messenger of death, so welcome to him, would not long delay his coming. He had attained to the days of the years of man's allotment, three-score and ten, and had rounded up a life of usefulness and exemplary Christianity rarely surpassed by men. He was not so much in public life as some men, though he once served a term on the board of county commissioners of Cabarrus. It was in the private walks of life that his virtues shone most brightly. His fervent piety combined with more than ordinary talent marked him as a suitable subject for a local minister. He belonged to the original, or what is known as the Northern M. E. Church. The deceased left his home and a comfortable estate to his only daughter and only surviving member of his family, Mrs. Edwin Smith.

The remains were laid in the graveyard of Mattin's Grove, where he was stately worshipped.

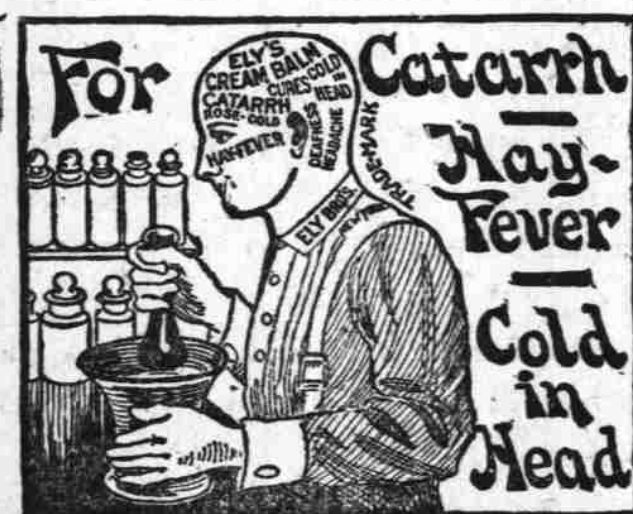
