## HE RESISTED ARREST.

David Hannan Taken by the Law for Cruelty to Animals - Policeman Harris Had to Use His Weapon in Defence of Himself - The Father in Jail While His Children Are at the County Home.

On Thursday afternoon Policeman Harris was informed that David Hannan, a man whose name has appeared in this paper several times when he would openly violate the law, was beating his horse unmercifully. Mr. Harris promptly went to his house near the depot and saw things as they really were. This man was beating his horse over the head and body, not with a whip, but with a club. Mr. Harris attempted to take the horse and hitch it and also to arrest Mr. Hannan. Mr. Hannan made a break for the policeman and had succeeded in getting his hands well on him. After scuffling a short while Mr. Harris pulled his "billy" on the man and was compelled to hit him a good blow before he would give up. Even the three children were taking their father's part, and one, the small boy, had the axe in his hand and was coming toward Mr. Harris.

His case was heard before Mayor Crowell, and in default of a \$75 bond for his appearance at next court he was taken to jail.

Only a short while ago his three small children were about to be taken from him on account of his negligent care of them, but the separation has now been made. They were taken to the county home that evening, where they will be cared for.

Mr. Hannan's head was hurt somewhat by Mr. Harris' blow, but nothing serious will result. Mr. Harris has only been out of bed a short while, and had he not used his weapon when he did it is very probable, he says, that the man would have gotten the better of him.

### The General Assembly Means Business.

The General Assembly is down to business in earnest to undo some of the mischief of fusion rule and do better. The bill to restore the convict roadworking law in Mecklenburg to what it was before has passed one reading in the House. A bill to relieve Wilmington of the dire fusion outrages has also been introduced. Hon. Lee S Overman has introduced a bill requiring the railroads to have separate cars for the races.

Clerkships have been cut 40 per cent.

A bill was introduced and passed in the Senate to undo that outrageous Halifax Stock law. A bill was also passed in the Senate to investigate the penitentiary affairs and to compel the attendance and testimony of witnesses. There are but nine pages in the House, one for each congressional district.

Mr. Julian, of Rowan, introduced a bill to so amend the State Constitution so as to separate the school taxes for the two races respectively.

Senator R L Smith of our district was elected chairman protem to act in the absence of Gov. Reynolds.

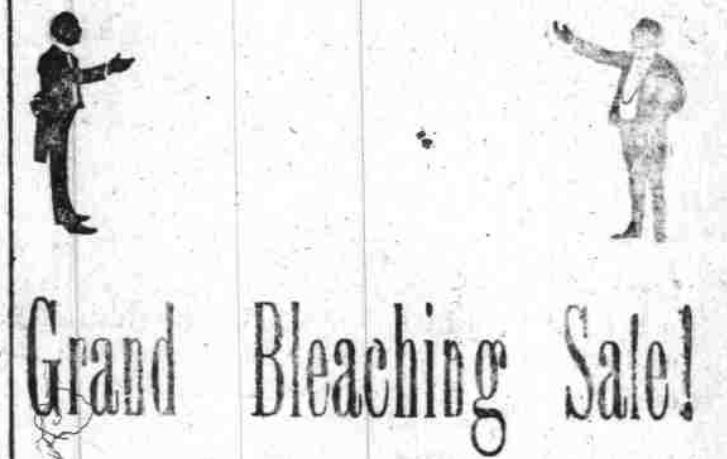
