C. A. TRAYLOR PARDONED.

Was Released Friday by Governor Russell After Serving Ten Months.

Chas. A. Traylor shed his convict clothes Friday afternoon and Friday night was a guest of one of Raleigh's most prominent hotels.

Traylor, who was perhaps one of the most noted convicts in the penitentiary, received a pardon from Governor Russell yesterday and in the afternoon he was a free man. He came to the city and registered at a leading hotel.

Ten months ago Traylor was brought to Raleigh from his home in Salisbury to serve a two years' term in the State prison for forgery. He was given light work and has done most of his work in the shirt factory.

Prior to his conviction young Traylor was prominent in sporting circles. He was a familiar character at race tracks and was well known over the State. His downfall occasioned great surprise among his friends.

The pardon of Traylor was not given out at the Governor's office yesterday. In fact, the Governor's private secretary has long since discontinued the practice of making public the operations of the pardon mill.—Raleigh Post of the 6th.

Ran Away From the County Home.

The three children of Mr. David Hannan, who were taken to the county home some days ago to be cared for, ran away last Saturday afternoon and came to their former home near the depot, having walked the distance of about 4 miles. Disposition has now been made of them, though, without taking them back to the county home. Mr. Wesley Sides, formerly a policeman, and to whom the children have become somewhat attached, took the smallest one, the girl, Mr. Jno. McDonald, who lives at the Cabarrus mill, took the other girl and the little boy, and will give them both a home at least for a while.

Twenty-Three Soldiers Hurt.

At Columbus, Ohio, last Friday morning 200 soldiers were hurled in indiscriminate mass by the falling of poorly constructed bunks, in which they were sleeping. Twenty-three were hurt, some very serious.
