## A HORRIBLE DEATH.

Mr. Wm. H. Branson of Durham Scalded to Death By the Bursting of a Steam Pipe—Superintendent Mathes Seriously Scalded.

A horrible accident occurred at a cotton mill at Durham Friday before noon when a pipe coming from a newly erected pump burst, filling the room in which Mr. W Branson and Superintendent Mathes were in with steam.

So full of steam was the room that the door could not be opened. Mr. Branson, during his suffering in the room, broke out a window glass and called for help. At last the wall on one side of the building broke and let out the steam.

But it was too late to save the life of Mr. Branson, whose body was badly scalded. He died that afternoon a few minutes after 5 o'clock. The condition of the superintendent was reported very serious on Friday night.

The sad news in regard to Mr. Branson came here that day, several dispatches having been received by Mr. J M Odell at different times. Besides being a shock to his friends and acquaintances the death rests heavily on the families of Messrs. J M and W R Odell. Mrs. Branson is a sister to Mrs. W R Odell and the love and care of almost a father has been bestowed upon the deceased by Mr. J M Odell.

Mr. Branson was one of the most enterprising mill men of our State and he held a position which will be a hard one for his successor to fill.

## SABBATH BELLS.

A Contribution Furnished for Thought Before the Sabbath Day—The Sabbath As Once and Now.

The approach of the Sabbath brings many an interesting question to the minds of the people. Were all the questions that arise in the minds of men audible we would be astonished that the people of this enlightened Nineteenth Century have such narrow views about this, the most Holy day of the week. In Exodus 16:23 the words of the Lord are repeated by Moses, "This is that which the Lord hath said: Tomorrow is the rest of the Holy Sabbath unto the Lord: bake that which ye will bake today and seethe that ye will seethe; and that which remaineth over lay up for you to be kept until the morning."

Jesus rebukes the Pharisees for their strict adherence to the letter of the law about the Sabbath. His aim is to teach them the proper spirit. Hear his words; Mark 2:27.

"The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath: Therefore the Son of man is Lord also of the Sabbath." Today he would say the Sabbath was made not that man might cease from their worldly business, but that they might enjoy the bounteous feast prepared by the spirit of God.

Would to God that we could all come to a higher appreciation of our Sabbath heritage! We cannot count the treasures of the Christian Sabbath. It spreads out over us the two wings of the Archangel of mercy. O blessed Sabbath! They scoff at the old Puritanic Sabbath,

the Sabbath they used to have in New England. I have never lived in New England but I would rather trust the Puritanic Sabbath with all its faults than this modern Sabbath which is fast declining from being a Sabbath at all. As soon as our modern Sabbaths will produce as stalwart characters as the New England Sabbath I am satisfied and shall be surprised. The Puritanic Sabbath had no watchers in the pew seeing whether the preacher could entertain an audience for twenty-five minutes or half an hour. It did not allow the sleeper to snore to his own comfort and to the discomfort of those that longed to hear the word of God. It was full of the music of voices blending in singing praises to God. Oh, blessed day! I should like to die some Sabbath morning when the air is full of church music and the bells are ringing. Leaving the home group with a dying blessing, I should like to look upon some Christian assembly chanting the praises of God as I went to join the one hundred and forty and four thousand and the thousand of thousands standing around the throne of the Son of God. Hark! I hear the "old kirk" on the hillside of Heaven! It is a wedding bell, for behold the bridegroom cometh! It is a victors bell, for we are more than conquerors through him that loved us. It is the Sabbath bell, for it calls the nations of earth and Heaven to everlasting repose. No. J.
