## SYNOD TAKES STEPS

For the Removal of North Carolina College from Mt. Pleasant—A Committee Appointed to Receive Bids—The Vote Stood 35 to 4—Resolutions Passed.

The most important subject and most interesting to the people, not only Lutherans, was the motion for the removal of North Carolina College from Mt. Pleasant. The report of the college was found to be not satisfactory, and resolutions were passed as follows:

"Whereas, The work of the North Carolina College is a necessity for the highest welfare and efficiency of our Church in North Carolina, and,

"Whereas, The college in its history has repeatedly presented discouraging reports to Synod of its condition, and,

"Whereas, The conviction is extensive that the location of the college is now unsuitable, and,

"Whereas, This conviction is a disadvantage to the college, therefore be it

Resolved, first, That a committee of three ministers and two laymen be appointed to solicit bids for a different location of the college.

"Resolved, second, That this committee be instructed to report at the next annual meet of Synod or at a called session, if necessary.

"Resolved, third, That for the present synodical year, the Synod obligate itself to pay 6 per cent. interest on \$800 of the indebtedness of the institution.

"Resolved, fourth, That the board of trustees be instructed to have the exercises of the college continued."

When the vote was cast for the acceptance or rejection of the resolutions the vote stood 35 to 4 in favor of its adoption. The committee appointed to receive the bids are: Rev. Chas. B Miller, Rev. R O Holland, D. D., Rev. O A Rose, Geo. E Ritchie and T L Ross.

The Synod adjourned Saturday night to meet next year at Albe-marle.

### He Made His Escape Dangerously.

On Sunday night Policeman Harris captured a white man beating the train. Having his hands full, he deputized Mr. Locke Parish to keep the man in custody. Mr. Parish was holding the man when the south-bound local passenger train came in. ## THE MAYOR'S COURT.

The negro who was beating his way on top of the northbound vestibule was sentenced to ten days on the chain gang, and the cost to be added which will amount to thirty days of work.
